New Scholarship Program (\$)

Two \$50 scholarships will be given each term to worthy Theta Chis, one to an upperclassman and one to a lowerclassman. The program was developed by brother Roger Tiple as a means to keep our high standings in overall GPA.

The recipients will be chosen on the basis of term GPA, GPA improvement, and house involvement. Final selection will be by the Executive Council.

The six scholarships given out over the school year were named after six of the founders of the Amicus Club and are charter members of Sigma chapter. Those brothers are: Ben Schubert, Charles Storz, Lee Woods, Spencer Mayhew, Olin Baum, and Francis Brown.

Funds for the scholarships will come from the golf tournament that will be held each summer (starting this summer), and from contributions to the *Sigma Tattler*. Our ultimate goal is better scholarship for everyone in the house and to have the best overall fraternity GPA.

Scholarship Fall 1980

Sigma Chapter of Theta Chi once again shook the framework of the Greek system at OSU. Last spring term TC moved from twenty-third in grades to third. Just to prove this was not a computer error or the bribing of officials, Theta Chi moved into the number-two standing for fall of 1980.

The overall GPA was 2.78. The live-in members were ranked fourth with a 2.79. Live-out members added an encouraging fifth-place position, compiling a 2.96 average. Our new pledge class was the surprise of all with a second-place spot and a 2.72 GPA.

Our success came from hard work and the right amount of social life (pits). Tim Dec, our scholarship chairman, was a contributing factor also. He was there when he was needed, and kept on the pledges and members to do the best that they possibly could. Tim made available all the necessary dates pertaining to classes, withdrawal, S-U grading, and also library and Memorial Union hours. New programs are also being

initiated to provide easy access to people who can help on an individual basis.

Theta Chi's next target is to be number one. It will provide a challenge to the house as a whole, while also providing individuals with personal goals of their own.

Christmas Party

This year, as in years past, the Christmas cheer flowed here at Theta Chi. One of the many activities centered around Christmas was our annual party for underprivileged kids.

The ages of the youths ranged from three to twelve years old. Although the older kids dominated the games, the younger ones captured the spotlight.

After the games (in which all of the brothers and Alpha Gamma Delta sorority also participated) ended, Santa Claus and his elves made their entrance. With sleigh bells approaching 10 decibels, they were immediately the center of attention. Santa, not knowing whether he just stepped into the Sigma chapter living room or the Oakland Raider backfield, was instantly mobbed by the kids. Once order was restored, the kids lined up to sit on Santa's lap. Each received an individual gift to go along with the prizes already awarded during the games period.

An Overall View from Dean Brennan

It's been two years now since I have had an opportunity to present a comment for the *Tattler*, and I am delighted to do so again. In that time, the chapter has grown in strength, not only in terms of quantity and continuity but also in the quality of its programs. It is my belief that the traditions of excellence and achievement are being established at Sigma chapter as opposed to those of mediocrity or just getting by. On our campus and throughout the fraternity world, however, there are still several problems that are of concern and have long-range potential consequences for our kind of living — specifically, problems associated with hazing and alcohol abuse. Contacts with colleagues and with national fraternities indicate there is continuing and increasing concern regarding fraternity hazing and initiation activities, activities which are potentially injurious and jeopardize an individual's health or safety. Regrettably, there are still examples of hazing which are conducted by the undergraduate chapters and sometimes perpetuated by alumni which have no place in today's fraternity world. Let us hope that our chapter continues to review and upgrade its programs and policies to insure that the negative vestiges of the past are not with us in the present.

The second concern has to do with alcohol abuse. Most campuses across the country seem to have accepted that alcohol is a way of life and that prohibition has not been any more effective on the college campus than it was in society in the 1930s. However, most campuses are also aware that the greatest number of problems with student conduct, damage to property, and conflicts between individuals are related to the misuse of alcohol. Again, let us hope that Sigma chapter is incorporating into its programming lessons on how to use alcohol responsibly. Certainly alumni and the model they present can have a tremendous impact in this regard.

In general, the state of the union for the fraternity system at Oregon State is positive. Figures show this fall that the system is at 92% capacity, up from 91% a year ago. The total number of men affiliated with fraternities is 1,849, which compares to 1,789 at the same time last fall, or 23% of the undergraduate men. Also, we hope that you had an opportunity to read the research project from the Counseling Center showing that of the freshmen who entered OSU in 1974, 54% of those who joined fraternities graduated compared to 44% of those who didn't join fraternities. Students from fraternities still occupy key positions in student government, on university committees, and provide much of the support to university activities and programs.

Let us hope the present trend for excellence and achievement continues.

Report from National Convention

As Sigma chapter's delegate to the national convention in New Orleans, LA, I set out to learn as much as possible to help the chapter out when I got back. Making the trip with me was brother Chris Flanigan, a fellow OSU undergraduate.

With the two of us we were able to cover twice as many seminars than I could have attended alone. Among the many workshops we attended were sessions of rush, leadership, hazing, pledge program, chapter organization, and alumni relations. Through these meetings we got many useful ideas, but we also found that Sigma chapter was very sound in its

programs already, and all we need is a few modifications.

One of my goals for Sigma chapter was to start receiving some national recognition for the good job we have done bringing our chapter to the top of the campus. We laid the groundwork by becoming good friends with the national officers (George T. Kilavos, especially) and with our regional staff. I've also set a goal for this publication to get the outstanding newsletter award at the next convention, and I see no difficulty there.

Aside from the learning experience at the convention, 75% of the time was spent taking advantage of New Orleans' unique atmosphere. I really don't need to tell you what kind of place it is, but let me assure you that everything you've ever heard about New Orleans is true!

I'm looking forward to attending the next convention as an alumnus (yes, alums have a place there too). We would like to have more than two attend the next one, because of the great many things to be learned and, of course, because of the great time. — Roger Tiple

Library Update

In the process of updating all the current programs of Sigma chapter of Theta Chi, it has been brought to our attention that our library is greatly understocked. The national bylaws state that each undergraduate chapter should have over 2,000 books accessible to the house undergraduates. Our library, at present, contains about 100 at the maximum.

Pledges

The members of Sigma chapter's pledge class have been busy working, studying, and playing during their first year of fraternity life. They have been drawn together through a number of activities this year, from Pussy Posse to the Mighty Red Ox to the recent experience of Orientation Week. The group of 27 was slightly split when 15 pledges were accepted to go

through Big I, but the group has had no trouble staying as close as it was all fall term.

One of the reasons that Theta Chi was second in grades this last fall term was because the pledges pulled a very good GPA of 2.73. This was good enough to give the pledges the second highest GPA among all other pledges on campus. In fact, the pledges' GPA was .11 higher than the average of all men at OSU.

The pledges are involved in the house also. They have contributed a rack of shelves for the kitchen and are planning the Spring House Dance, which will be held at the Timberline Lodge on April 11. The class had its first social function set for the USC basketball game with the Kappa pledges.

Diversity continues to be a big part of the '80 pledge class. Ted Schmidt has accepted an opportunity to go on an exchange to Australia for a year, and now he is attending the University of New South Wales. The midyear rush program has come through with two good pledges, John Petersen and Jim Imper.

Pledge class president Skip Carbin commented on the diversity of the class, saying, "We have a great bunch of men who are academically oriented and good prospects for house officers. Some are wild, some are trying to get involved, all are gaining a foothold in college life, and all are proud to be a part of Theta Chi."

Football

The 1980 Theta Chi football team once again captured first place in its league after moving up from last year's league into a more competitive one this summer.

With a new league before us, it took a while to acquire our usual tough defense and offense. Our first game we dropped to Sigma Nu, 14-0. But, contrary to what it looks like, we followed directly with a 12-0 win over the Fijis, who came into the match undefeated. Following is the listing of the teams we played and the scores:

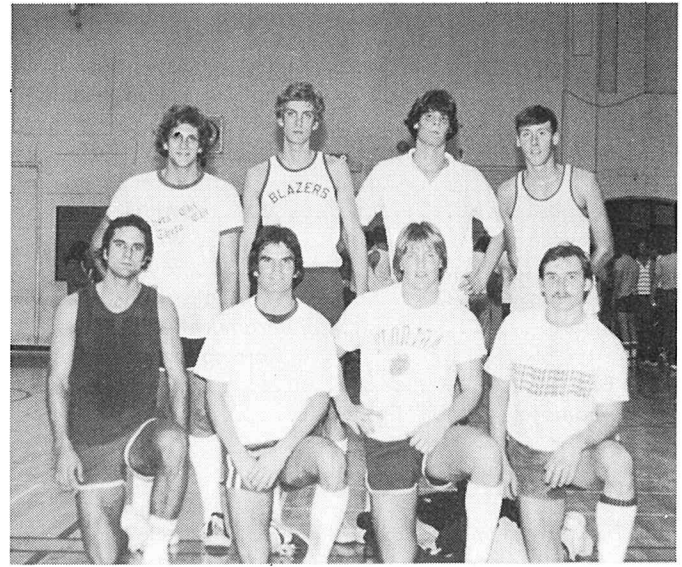
Volleyball Champions

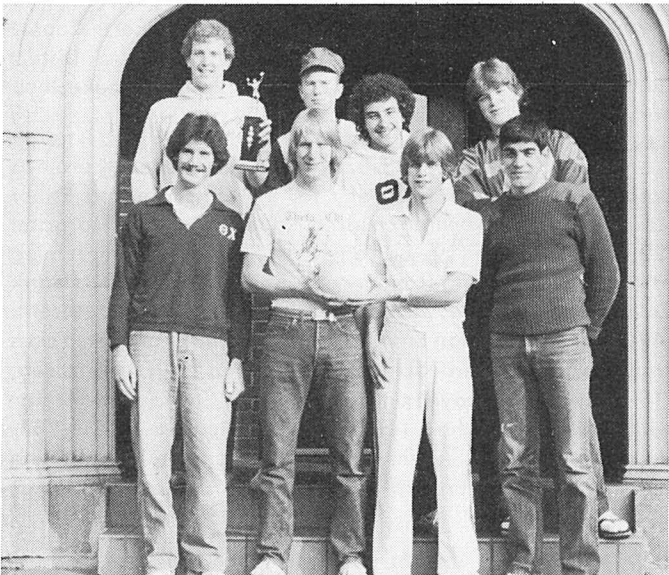




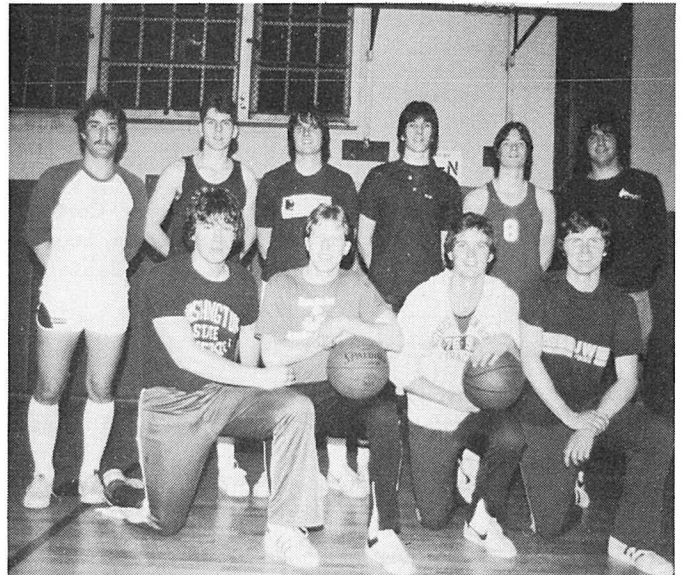
