Grand Chapter VP Pays a Visit

The phone rings. It's 2:00 p.m. Sunday. Lt. Smith of the Corvallis Police Department informs you that your son has died. You learn through the patrol details that his death was related to his fraternity initiation activities at OSU. How would you react?

Winter term, OSU students had the honor of hearing Dave Westol speak about Greek hazing. Dave is the Assistant District Attorney of Kalamazoo, Michigan, and also serves as the national vice president for the Grand Chapter of Theta Chi. In his duties as vice president, he tours the country giving lectures at different universities on various topics, particularly on the topic of hazing in fraternities and sororities. His point in these lectures is that hazing is entirely unnecessary and serves no purpose in the spirit of brotherhood. Due to the nature of his lectures and the style in which they are presented, the listener is forced to ask himself serious questions concerning the usefulness of hazing.

Dave presented a hypothetical case in which a pledge in a fraternity died as a result of hazing. Dave followed this by describing how he would prosecute such a case. As he spoke, the audience eventually began to realize the uselessness and stupidity of hazing. He gave several examples of alternatives to hazing that were both meaningful and within the boundaries of national guidelines and regulations.

Following his speech, Dave had dinner at the Sigma Chapter of Theta Chi and spoke with us about the Grand Chapter activities. We were encouraged to find that the Grand Chapter has been following Sigma's progress and is pleased with the reputation we have established at OSU. The brothers of Sigma Chapter were honored to have Dave as a guest, even if only for a short visit. He provided valuable insight into ourselves and the workings of our fraternity. President's Report

When I began my term of office in January, my major concern was our low position (19th) on the grade scale. Scholarship has been the number one concern of Sigma Chapter for the past several years, and my executive officers and I wished to keep this as our highest priority. We felt that trying to rise from number 19 to number one in a single term would be an unrealistic and unobtainable goal, so we set the objective of breaking into the top ten. Through promoting an atmosphere conducive to studying, brothers helping each other study, and older members applying peer pressure, we achieved the ranking of fifth place. This term we are setting up a program in which each member and pledge lists his classes and the grades he is striving to receive in each. With each individual listing and trying to accomplish his own goals, we might once again enjoy the number-one position in scholastics.

Over the last three months we have initiated 22 outstanding pledges into the brotherhood of Theta Chi. We feel that

these individuals differ in their personalities and talents, yet they all have shown the desire to do everything in their power to promote the ideals of Theta Chi. If these new brothers keep the purpose of Theta Chi on their minds and keep giving 100% in promotion of Theta Chi, we may become the strongest chapter on campus. — *Todd Underhill*

Theta Chi Back in Top Five

High standards and genuine concern regarding academics are stressed among the brothers at Theta Chi. Once again, these standards have been upheld as Theta Chi bounced back from a disappointing 19th place in grades for fall of 1982, to fifth place for winter 1983.

In trying to maintain our tradition of high-level accomplishment, some innovative ideas have been added to our scholarship program. To assist the brothers in seeking academic help among each other, an extensive tutor list was devised listing a wide range of classes offered here at the university with each brother's name listed under a particular class he has taken. This tutor list is constantly being updated and is posted on our scholarship bulletin board. Another program instituted by our scholarship chairman is a card file of professors. This file consists of index cards arranged by course. On each card, the course is listed along with the professor's name and an evaluation written by a brother who had that particular class. The purpose for this file is to assist the brothers in selecting courses and to aid in the choosing of professors during registration. So far, these two new programs have proved very helpful, especially to the pledges.

According to tradition, our main objective is academic quality. This tradition will endure because the men of Theta Chi are determined to maintain a high level of accomplishment. — *Chris Wyatt, Scholarship Chairman*

Rush Update

The outlook for rush this year at Sigma Chapter is looking very positive. By the end of fall term we had pledged 31 fine men. We lost a few due to financial reasons, but the 26 outstanding men who remained have been initiated into the brotherhood. As for informal rush, we have acquired four new pledges who are already participating in various house committees and activities.

At present, there are already five rushees signed up to stay at our house during rush week. We have set a goal of pledging between 25 and 30 men, and want to focus our attention on helping them achieve high academic standing and brotherhood. To date, there have been two rush weekends that have proved very beneficial, and there are three additional upcoming dates with activities including the Greek Wheel. As far as the summer rush functions are concerned, we have set up a variety of activities including the annual raft trip, snow skiing, a weekend of water-skiing, and several get-togethers.

Since we achieved fifth in grades out of 28 fraternities winter term, we're focusing our attention on high school seniors with high grade point averages. That's not to say we're looking for "book worms," but we're trying to maintain the high standards and reputation here at Sigma Chapter.

In closing, I would simply like to extend my thanks to all alums who sent rushee recommendation cards to us. I would also like to encourage others to become active in Sigma's rush program by sending their recommendations for young men coming to OSU next year who are interested in fraternities.
