During fall term 1983 we took a big stride toward better scholarship. After an all-time low mark from spring term, we earned a "fair" 13th place in the fraternity polls this fall.

Through the committee system I now have five members to assist me in the creation and installation of conducive scholarship programs. They will also assist in the carrying out of the programs and the enforcement of quiet hours and study tables.

Our first concern is to find out early in the term which brothers are having grade trouble so that we, the committee, can decide how to help each struggling brother on an individual basis. We will accomplish this by passing out a form and requiring each member to list his midterm, homework, lab, current, and expected grades in each class. This will allow us to monitor everyone's progress.

Room test calendars are another idea which will allow everyone in each room to know when the others have tests. This will hopefully be an incentive for roommates to be more courteous before test time and a way for them to make sure the others are studying when they should be.

Wetter Than Usual

This has been a wet year, especially for Sigma Chapter. A pipe, cracked by freezing temperatures, unleashed a downpour which started in the attic and ended in the basement. One member was here during the Christmas break when the down-pour occurred and was able to notify the fire department. They luckily had sufficient equipment to remove most of the water that night, greatly reducing the negative effects the water would have produced.

The water caused a great deal of damage. The second deck hallways lost at least half of the ceiling tiles. The pledge porch also received a soaking. The carpet has been removed, but the strong odor still forces many to sleep in their rooms. The first deck was also water damaged. Paint peeled off the ceiling and one wall has warped enough to bulge and crack the plaster, requiring extensive repairs. Other damages occurred, such as loosened paneling, burnt-out light sockets, stained ceilings, and many other smaller damages.

Expenses for the repairs are being covered by insurance, with the alumni paying the \$1,000 deductible. This might allow the chapter to pick which items it would fix, such as the tiles and carpets, while the plaster work could be done by professionals. The money for labor would go to the house, along with the pride of working with the brothers to keep the house strong and respectable.

Spotlight on Scott Jockers

When Scott Jockers was in the house from late 1978 to 1982, he saw quite a few changes take place. When he entered the house it had 46 live-ins and the chapter was 26th in grades. The athletic activities, however, were always top-notch. There were many brothers who were very active and motivated themselves to improve the chapter's standing on campus. Theta Chi reached its goals in 1981, a banner year. Sigma Chapter achieved first in grades, had over 70 live-ins, went to the championship games in three different IM sports, and won first place in the IFC Sing for the first time ever! Rooms were remodeled by live-in brothers and this, coupled with a huge overall alumni remodeling of general rooms in the house, makes the house a pleasure to see and live in. With all of this he had little time to study, which led to his reputation as an "exam crammer." Surprisingly, he graduated from the OSU School of Business with honors.

Scott congratulated the undergraduates on their recent achievement of reaching 13th in grades overall. He said this was quite an improvement from 27th and is hoping the improvement will continue. However, to the alumni he stresses involvement. Many have responded with generous donations, but we would always appreciate a few more alumni donating time to come down for Monday night dinners or other chapter events.

Scott Jockers, who was recently elected president of the Alumni Board, has contributed greatly to Sigma Chapter and is another example of what Theta Chi is all about: "The Helping Hand."
