Alumni Board Launches Capital Campaign Plans

Times have changed. Priorities are different. Being a fraternity man means something again. As our undergraduate brothers embrace fraternity life sans alcohol, alumni support becomes more critical than ever. If you've visited the chapter house in the past couple of years, you know the house needs work, a lot of it. Unfortunately, the Alumni Corporation has not been in the position financially to provide for the extensive renovation the house requires.

As you have read in some of the newsletter's other articles, the brotherhood is still very strong and we have had tremendous success recruiting new members. But to ensure our fraternity continues to thrive well into the new century, our alumni base must contribute the capital needed to pay for the requisite improvements to the chapter house. As we are still in the embryonic stages of forging a capital campaign, we do not yet have an exact dollar amount in mind, but expect it to be several hundreds of thousands. Obviously, for an undertaking of this magnitude to be successful, it will require a significant commitment of time, energy, and experience by those involved. And hiring a professional firm that specializes in capital campaigns to oversee the endeavor appears to be our best option. However, these firms require in the neighborhood of \$10,000 just to perform a feasibility study, which includes a structural evaluation of the facility and examination of the alumni base to determine whether the support structure exists to mount a successful campaign. If

they believe it can be done, they will continue with their efforts and do so for a fee — usually a percentage of the total amount of funds raised.

In October, the Alumni Corporation received a generous contribution from one of our brothers in the amount of \$28,000! This donation was earmarked to pay off outstanding debt, and it has given us a renewed sense of encouragement for the future of Sigma Chapter. I hope this issue of the *Tattler* reaches the homes of other successful alumni brothers who are compelled to help provide the present and future Sigma men a rewarding college experience. Other fraternities on campus, such as Kappa Sigma, Alpha Sigma Phi, and Sigma Phi Epsilon, to name a few, have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to renovate their chapter houses. I have faith that the alumni members of Sigma Chapter will extend a helping hand during our fraternity's time of need, also.

James L. Badley, Sigma '61, Inspires "A Story of Healing After Vietnam"

Many Sigma brothers, particularly from the years 1960-65, already know about the book, *Angels Unknown*, by Lynda Twyman Paffrath. She wrote the book about Jim Badley, Sigma 1961, a fighter pilot who died in Vietnam in 1968. During their college years, Lynda was Jim's girlfriend. She was inspired to write the book after Jim's sister, Bonnie, contacted her for help in trying to find answers to many questions surrounding her brother's death. In helping Bonnie investigate the circumstances of Jim's death, Lynda was forced to confront painful memories and unresolved feelings of her own, as well as the confusion and disillusionment shared by many Americans during and after the Vietnam War. Those awakened emotions led her to write the book, to which she gave the subtitle, "A Story of Healing After Vietnam."

According to Lynda, Jim lived in the Sigma chapter house for five years and considered it his home while he was an OSU student. He served as president of the chapter and house man-

ager during those years. After his death, the OSU Air Force ROTC squadron was renamed in Jim Badley's honor. Included in the promotional flyer for *Angels Unknown* are two quotes:

"*Angels Unknown* will make you proud, it will make you sad, and I guarantee it will make you see a facet of the war in Vietnam you haven't seen before. You won't be able to put it down." — Maj. Gen. Frederick C. Blesse, USAF (Ret.), Vietnam veteran and author of *Check Six, A Fighter Pilot Looks Back*

"Lynda Paffrath's book brought back a flood of memories that I did not know were still there, as well as some I resolutely hang onto. *Angels Unknown* will give you a rare insight into the personality, commitment, and character of a young fighter pilot in Vietnam, and his influence on those who loved him."

Four Attend Leadership Conference



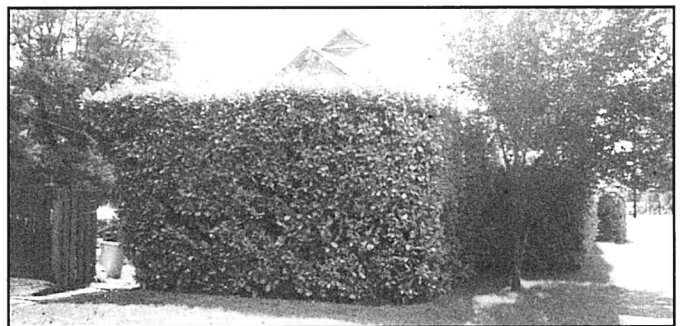

On July 25, 2001, Sigma Chapter and your alumni donations helped send four undergraduate brothers to the University of Maryland College Park to Theta Chi Fraternity's Ninth Chapter Leadership Conference. CLC is held every odd-numbered year, alternating with the National Convention, which takes place in even-numbered years. The Leadership Conference lasted until July 29 and was action-packed, with all activities focused on improving operations in chapters.

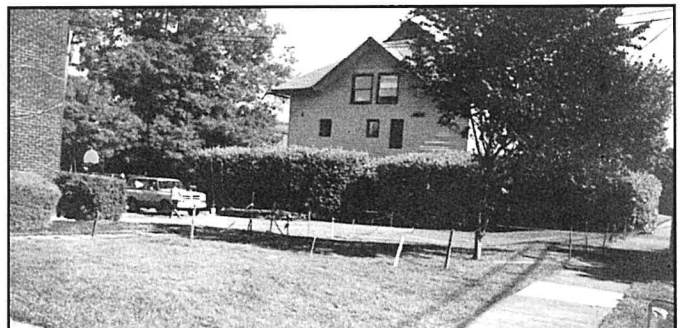
The registration fees, totaling \$600, were paid by the chapter and your donations. It was each brother's responsibility to pay for his own plane ticket. The four brothers who attended were Shaun Harris, David Zahradnik, and Zach and Riley Zarosinski. Each brother chose a different area in which to specialize his training. Five program areas were offered, each consisting of five training sessions to earn certification. Brother Harris chose Ritual; brother Zahradnik selected Recruitment; brother Riley Zarosinski chose Membership Education; and brother Zach Zarosinski chose LEAD, Theta Chi's new Leadership, Education, and Academic Development accreditation program, which Sigma Chapter is working to become a part of. All four brothers gained something special from the event and plan to make use of their new ideas, from incorporating parts of the ritual we've not used before to implementing new scholarship programming in the chapter. Next year's National Convention will be held in St. Louis from July 10-15. — Shaun Harris

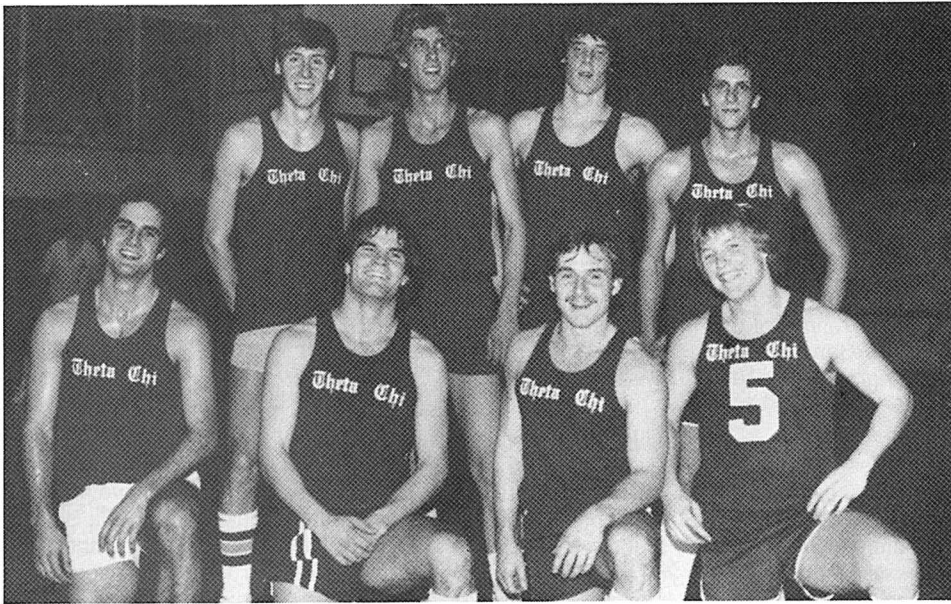
