and I urge all of you in the future to join us for the annual Sigma Tailgater.

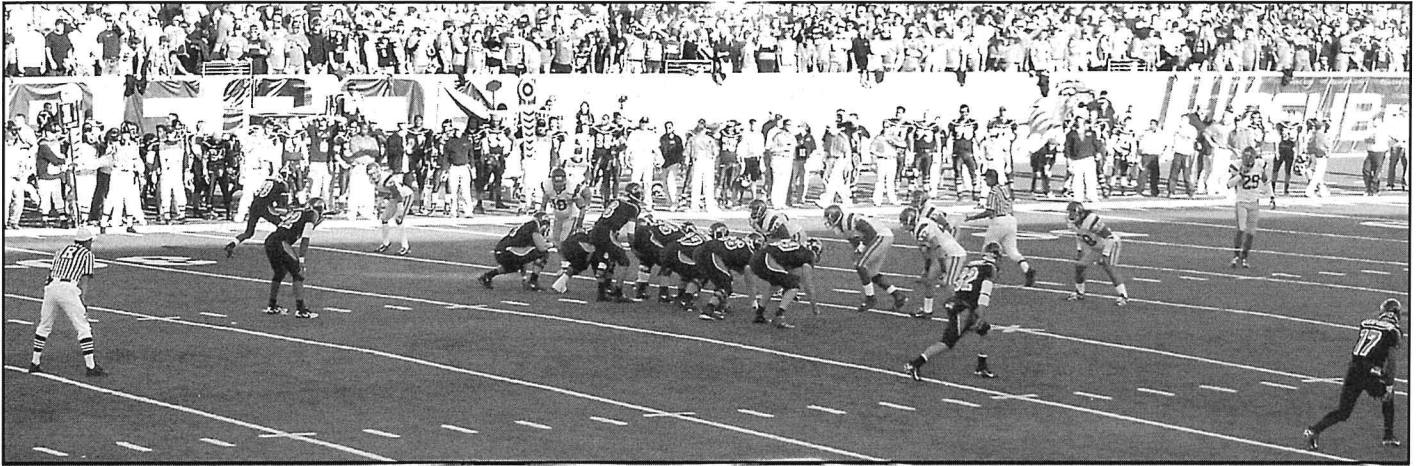

# Theta Chi 150th Anniversary Convention Report

This past June, I had the privilege and honor of representing Sigma Chapter at the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Theta Chi Fraternity at the site of its founding, Norwich University in Vermont. The convention was an opportunity to experience both the ritual and business side of a national convention, immerse one's self in the environment of Theta Chi's founding, see artifacts from Theta Chi's history, and enjoy the beauty of New England. After purchasing an almost new, used car, in New York City, my wife, JoAnn, and I proceeded to drive through the beautiful Hudson Valley and Adirondack mountains, to the little village of Norwich and Norwich University.

Vermont in general is lightly populated with less than 700,000 people in the entire state, but Norwich University is especially isolated with virtually none of the distractions normally found near colleges. Perhaps this absence of outside stimulation is appropriate given the objective of preparing graduates for a military career, but the relative isolation condemned the activity agenda for spouses to a valiant attempt to inject excitement in a countryside absolutely devoid of shopping-atractions. Who knew that the gals wouldn't be excited about a granite quarry!!!, ....not exactly the glamorous itinerary I had promised JoAnn. Nonetheless, the local tour guides did make the spouse's tour a success.

The University itself is small, tidy, and austere with crisply defined buildings and grounds, and dormitories that had all the ambience of the barracks I remember from U.S. Army boot camp in Fort Ord. If the dorms were austere, the convention itself didn't lack for color. The ritual portion was impressive, with all the dignity and ceremony one expects from the Grand Chapter. Matching the ritual, the display of Fraternity artifacts was equally impressive with much regalia and memorabilia from the earliest days of the Fraternity, including the original badges commissioned by founders Freeman and Chase. While these activities had their appeal, I was most interested in the convention business which centered on the debate over the alcohol free housing clause in the Fraternity's By Laws. The debate was prompted by a group of chapters that had petitioned for a modification of the alcohol prohibition to simply require chapter hous-

ing be in compliance with local and university regulations governing alcohol use. Typical of the Chapters advocating the change, was the Chapter at the University of British Columbia where the drinking age is 18, and recruits are loath to give up their right to drink by joining an alcohol free house. From the strength of the debate, and the final vote, which retained the current wording, it was evident the membership remains deeply divided over this issue.

From the perspective of Sigma Chapter, the debate is of particular importance. Sigma competes for recruits on a university campus where alcohol free housing is not mandated in fraternities or dormitories, and many of the fraternities remain wet. While I personally favor a return to the regime present at Sigma during my era, in which the house was alcohol free, I recognize that the student housing environment today is vastly different and more competitive. Therefore, I came away from the Convention favoring a modification of the By Laws. Fortunately a middle ground is available. By meeting certain criteria covering membership, scholarship, and alcohol abuse training, individual chapters can obtain a modified waiver of the alcohol prohibition. The waiver allows limited use of alcohol during certain time periods, and certain activities. After discussing the convention results with fellow Sigma Alumni Board members and the undergraduates, I am convinced Sigma Chapter should pursue an alcohol waiver from the national Theta Chi organization as a necessary accommodation to recruiting on the Oregon State campus. A modified alcohol-free policy, in my opinion, will aid recruiting, and is consistent with the Fraternity's creed of teaching truth, temperance, and tolerance.

After three days of convention activity, my wife and I left the green hills of Vermont with some new-found friends, fond memories of Norwich University, a fresh appreciation of the strength of our Theta Chi Grand Chapter, and a new perspective on alcohol free housing. Ahead, lay an exciting 4,000-mile road trip in our new Mercedes dodging everything from Illinois hailstorms, to Detroit gangsters, to Wyoming buffalo, across the beauty and breadth of America..... But that's another story, for another day.
