Library Remodel

Dear Brothers:

We thank all of you who have contributed to the Library Remodel Fund!

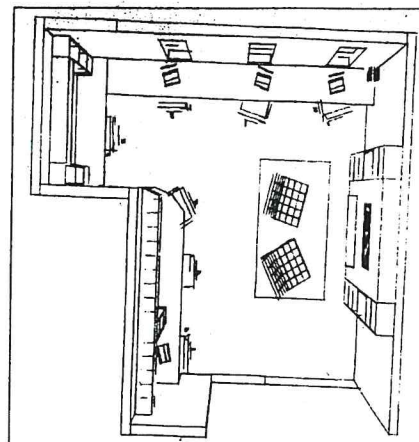
The summer break and emergent capital projects slowed the progress of the library remodel since our last report in the Summer 2010 *Sigma Tattler*. Brother **Sam Royster**, who has been supervising the project, spent the summer with a full-time nuclear engineering internship plus 16 credits of summer school classes, so he had little time for much else. Additionally, a costly overhaul of the kitchen fume hood system was required this fall, in order to meet current fire code standards.

Alumni donations have put the chapter on more firm financial ground, and we have moved forward into the architectural design phase of the library remodel. The designer is Sam Royster's younger brother, who is in his third year studying interior architecture at Academy of Art University in San Francisco. Once the initial design is finalized and approved by the chapter, we will begin the bidding process with local contracting firms. We hope to begin construction in the spring term or in the summer of this year, so the project will be completed by next fall.

As we reported in the Summer 2010 *Tattler*, initial estimates put the library remodeling cost at around \$5,000. During Mom's Weekend 2010, our moms donated \$1,000 toward the project. Alumni donations designated for the library remodel have raised that total to \$3,550 so far — which means we are ALMOST there with the funds we need!

Thank you, brothers, for your continuing support of our library remodel and of Sigma Chapter. Watch for an update of our progress in the next issue of the *Tattler*!

Anthony Rue Returns From Study and Travel Abroad

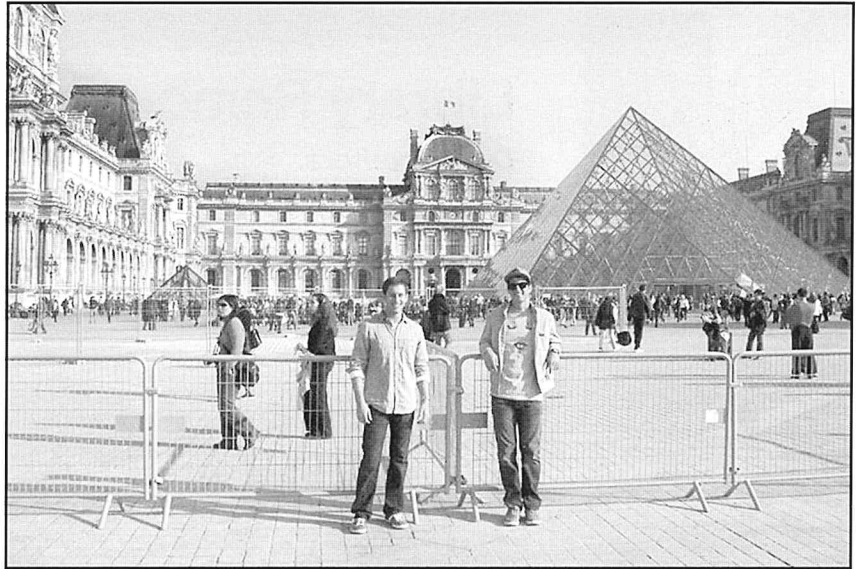
Dear Brothers,

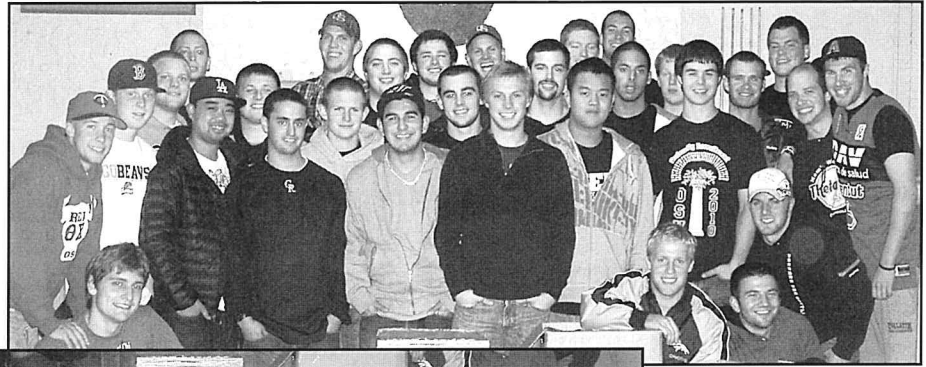

This successful project had all of Sigma Chapter participating during the week. Other OSU Greeks were involved, as well: more than 150 girls came to pie us in the face on Friday.

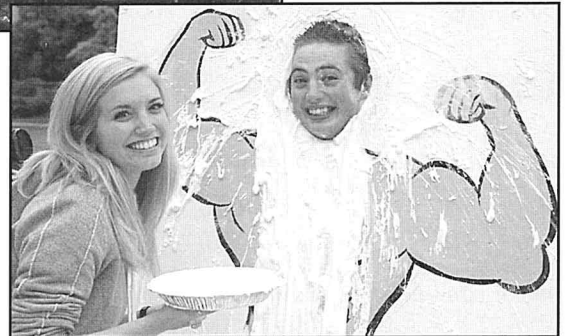
