Building a Bigger, Better, and More Involved Chapter

This past October, Sigma Chapter of Theta Chi welcomed 34 new pledges. On the surface, this large pledge class proves that our chapter is growing in numbers, but I believe our accomplishment goes much deeper and really shows the direction in which we are moving.

Successful recruitment is an ever-present goal and a year-around endeavor. But from June to October, our brothers demonstrated both their ability to organize the whole chapter for participation in recruitment events, and to showcase the diverse character of our membership, which attracted larger numbers of incoming freshmen to Sigma Chapter this year.

The goal throughout the summer months was to contact and recruit outstanding individuals who would provide the base of the fall 2011 pledge class, so that we could build on that base once incoming freshmen arrived on campus in September. Through a whole chapter effort to contact more than 1,000 incoming freshmen, and summer events such as rafting trips, camping trips, and baseball games, we successfully recruited the foundation of our 2011 fall pledge class.

Incoming freshmen arrived on campus September 18, and for the next three weeks before fall recruitment was over on October 7, Sigma Chapter sponsored a rush event every day. These events were open to anyone interested in joining a fraternity. Our ability to organize events and people was the key to success during each event in this period.

In my opinion, the largest obstacle to successful recruitment has always been attracting people to our chapter events who are actually interested in joining a fraternity. Once we get people to our events, we are confident that a large percentage of people will see the diverse character of our membership today, and thus will want to become a member of Theta Chi at Sigma Chapter. We feel that the diversity of our chapter is a real asset, and we are confident that Sigma Chapter will continue to attract large pledge classes for years to come.

Winter 2012



Winter term is off on a good foot. New undergraduate executive officers were elected at the end of fall term, and they have been installed. In cooperation with the Chapter's faculty advisor, Scott Reid, the outgoing undergraduate president, Gerald Gale, arranged to have a human resources consultant facilitate the transition of officers. As is generally expected around the changing of the guard, there were some wrinkles that still needed to be ironed out, but our January Board meeting was very productive in addressing these issues. We have a solid leadership group in place, and the Board is confident they will perpetuate the positive momentum that has been building for the past few years.

Last spring, the Board urged the undergrads to make recruitment a top priority. They listened and had the most successful rush in recent memory, jumping 34 guys! Of this group, a class of 24 was proudly initiated as brothers of Sigma Chapter. This influx of new members should allow the house to reach its goal of 35 men living in the Chapter house for spring term, and 40 next fall. Should the Chapter be able to sustain that number of live-ins going forward, the house will stand on a firm ground financially and allow us to make the improvements the facility so desperately needs. As further evidence of this upward movement, Theta Chi posted a top-3 grade report for fall term, and is competing with Kappa Kappa Gamma in IFC Sing this spring.

With the addition of **Jeff Griggs '08** to the Alumni Board this fall, we are now in the unique position of having three Corvallis residents on the Board; the other two are **Larry Kampfer '64** (Treasurer) and **Bryon Van Fleet '65** (Secretary). The rest of the Board is comprised of **Roger Rollins '59**, **Gil Miller '61** (Vice President), **Shaun Harris '00**, **Dave Zahradnik '00**, and **Steve Wright '93** (President).

Work Week 2011:

“A little money and a lot of elbow grease”

What we accomplished with a little money and a lot of elbow grease was nothing short of impressive. Sheetrock and crown molding were installed on the entire second-deck ceiling, and the job was finished with a new coat of paint from the floor up. We applied more than \$500 worth of paint, not only to the second deck, but to the first-story exterior, fire escapes, and other interior areas as needed. Special thanks to brother **Colton Fettig's '09** father, Joe Fettig, for lending us his airless paint sprayer. After the painting was completed, industrial-strength carpet was professionally installed on the first and second decks, and it looks outstanding. Using as much ingenuity as we could, old furniture and our well-used projection TV were sold, and we now have a 55-inch flatscreen TV in the living room. The rest was in the details: new fixtures and valves for the kitchen, window latches replaced, doors trimmed for the new carpet, general yard work, etc. The men of Sigma Chapter exhausted all resources in a seven-day work week and dedicated roughly 2,000 man hours to get the house geared up for the year. We still have work to do, but it was a giant step forward, and future planned improvements will restore the Sigma Chapter house to its original glory.

On a final note, an important intangible benefit of work week is the leadership and motivation you find among the members. These qualities in our Sigma brothers made one thing clear: the Chapter is in good hands, and is once again in the highest echelon of fraternities at Oregon State University.

Chapter President's Report

It's hard to believe that just over a year ago, I was elected to serve as Sigma's chapter president for 2011. At the time, I had many ideas and plans for improving the chapter and the brotherhood experience. Yet today, it's hard to put into words what that actually feels like. I have gained a perspective on life that most individuals are not blessed to see in their lifetime, and I am humbled by the thought of it.

Because of this, we were able to support our Mac Miller concert, perform well in sports, and promote an increasing leadership role within IFC and the Oregon State community. The percentage of our brothers leading other organiza-

tions on campus is at an all-time high, and that percentage continues to increase. In addition, we continued to do well in the classroom. At the end of spring term 2011, we placed third in grades overall, and we continue to do well academically. Our study tables fill up most nights, and everyone is talking about their classes throughout the school year.

With our newly elected president, **Mitch King ['09]**, and vice-president, **Joe Cuellar ['09]**, Sigma is aiming to become an exemplary chapter on campus. We aren't there yet, but we are moving forward steadily. Our recent visit with the Leadership Education Consultant from Theta Chi Headquarters made us confident that Sigma Chapter will, at the very least, receive a Chapter Excellence Award at the start of summer 2012, with a possibility of Alter Award consideration. Are we at the level of an Alter Award-winning chapter? Not quite, but the point is: we will be very soon.

In closing, I hope I have shed some light on our direction and promising future. That said, there are still areas that need work. However, I am a proud outgoing president, confident that our chapter will continue its forward momentum. We have a devoted and bright-eyed executive board for 2012. I will never forget my presidential experience.

This past fall term, Sigma Chapter hosted its annual philanthropy, the Greek OlympiX, and donated proceeds from the week of fun competitions to the Fender Music Foundation, which helps fund music programs in schools throughout the nation. Among the numerous competitive events were a scavenger hunt, push-ups, daily check-ins, and everyone's favorite, "Pie-a-Theta Chi." This year, we decided to add a concert to our week of activities, and the concert fell on a perfect date, since our philanthropy took place during the week leading up to Halloween. We called the concert "Theta Chi's FRIGHT NIGHT," and it was not only a great way of raising money for charity, but also a giant recruitment tool at the same time. This year's concert featured up-and-coming hip-hop artist Mac Miller, PUTS (People Under the Stairs), and Casey Veggies. We believe more than 4,000 people from Corvallis, Eugene, Portland, and around Oregon showed up. Last year, we raised about \$1,250, but this year we raised \$5,000!

It was a great week for brothers of Sigma Chapter!
